Grandview Heights Public Library: AN APPRECIATION

hen the Grandview Heights/Marble Cliff Historical Society came into existence in 1974, the founders envisioned an organization that would document the rich history of the Tri-Village area, as well as begin an archive of historical documents and artifacts. When space was needed to house this archive, the Grandview Heights Public Library graciously came forward with an offer to locate that space in their building. They offered the fledgling volunteer group a small room in what is now their reference area, which is still in use today. Thus began a great symbiotic relationship between two important contributors to the residents of our communities.

The Library has been a very supportive host for our Society activities. In addition to providing our Society "headquarters," they provide meeting space for our monthly board meetings and our annual meeting. The wonderfully professional library staff have helped us in many ways. They constantly answer questions of patrons regarding the activities of the Society, they advise us on techniques and approaches for gathering and storing documents and photographs, and they treat our valuable materials as if they were their own.

Library director Carol Pelz and Mary Ludlum in particular have been incredible friends of the Society and the historical activities that represent what we are about. Recently they wrote and received a grant to digitize all of the Grandview Heights High School yearbooks and put them online, a project which parallels the efforts of our own archiving initiatives. This project has made a rich resource of historical information immediately available to Grandview residents (and the world!). Several years ago the Society decided to embark on a new archiving effort by creating a web site that would contain links to virtual representations of our resources.

With our limited budget, we faced a problem in procuring a service provider to host our site. The Library came through for us again. Carol Pelz arranged with the Central (Ohio) Library Consortium in Lithopolis to provide

As a change of pace I am sharing some unique photos in this issue. Special thanks to Galen Gonser, whose avid interest in early photographs often prompts him to share items from his collection.

Many thanks also to Pat Behmer Preble of Daytona Beach, Florida for sharing the marvelous photos of her grandfather, Fred Behmer, Sr. Pat wrote that her grandfather was a professional photographer from age 16 until well into his 70's. He began his career with Baker Studio and also worked for the Columbus Star. Behmer was the first to take pictures of away Ohio State football games for publication in the next morning's paper. He dried photo plates on a potbelly stove on the return train trip from the game. He worked as a commercial photographer at Jeffrey Manufacturing for over 50 years. His son, Fred Behmer, Jr. also worked with his father as a photographer at Jeffrey until his retirement. Fred Behmer, Sr. is immortalized on the next page as one of the "Wyandotte Indians".



Marble Cliff Station: Panoramic view looking east from approximately the site of Highlights for Children building on Rt. 33. To the right, along Fifth Avenue starting at the tracks, are the Marble Cliff Railroad Station and post office/general store. The Price family homes are along the ridge to the right. The distinguished appearing young men are standing on the railroad spur leading into the quarry. They remain unidentified, and we hope some reader may know who they are.

Carl Lindenberg House: This rare photograph shows the home of Carl Lindenberg as originally designed by Frank Packard in 1903, with its brown shingle siding. This view is of the front of the house, which faced west. This home, at the corner of Cambridge Boulevard and Village Court, retains the large overhangs, but has been stuccoed and the porte-cochere has been removed. It is now entered from Cambridge Boulevard, the original rear of the home.

Wyandotte Indians: Fred A. Behmer is the fifth "Indian" from the left. The "Wyandottes" won first prize in the 1922 Field Day Parade. A newspaper article of the day states that 96% of Wyandotte Road residents who could walk participated. Men, women and children covered themselves with grease paint and participated in various tableaus on floats that stretched for three blocks. A portrayal of the Execution of Chief Leatherlips made spectators gasp with awe.
