Windows to the Past



The photo above appeared on the June 1924 cover of *Jeffrey Service*, the house organ of Jeffrey Manufacturing, a major Columbus industry. It is the work of Fred A. Behmer, Sr., at that time a resident of Wyandotte Road in Grandview Heights. Behmer was chief photographer for Jeffrey Manufacturing for nearly 50 years.

In the photo, taken in a GHHS classroom, are Irene Hankinson, Assistant Principal and math teacher of Grandview Junior High School; Milton M. Williams, Superintendent of Grandview Heights Public Schools and Upper Arlington Public Schools; and students Doris Sutton and Bob Springer, both GHHS 1928. Williams left Grandview Schools the next year. In 1925 Irene Hankinson married Thomas Newton Brown, former Grandview Heights High School Principal, teacher at West High School in Columbus. Their son, Herbert Russell Brown, is a Columbus attorney, former Ohio Supreme Court Justice (1987-1993), novelist and playwright.

The November-December 1928 *Jeffrey Service* cover photo by Fred A. Behmer, Sr. Pictured in their living room at 1576 West First Avenue are three members of the C.J. Leifeld family. Leifeld was Jeffrey Manufacturing Purchasing Agent.

The caption reads, in part: "During the latter part of August a successful demonstration was made in New York City whereby radio engineers produced images in a television test." "... Leifeld is shown giving his two youngsters a treat with his television set. Santa Claus is on his way and Martha Jane and Jack are anxiously watching him."

The *Jeffrey Service* cover photo for April, 1924. "The marble season is on. On the street corners, in the school yards, and in the recreational centers you will find boys enjoying their games of marbles. Puries, agates, imitations, crystals or glassies, snowflakes, crockers or potties, witches, chinies, whities or commies, all have their value to the boy." "...The group of boys on the cover page was found on Goodale St., near the Goodman Guild House."

Edison School Turns 100!

GHMCHS trustees Tom DeMaria and Wayne Carlson presented an hour program, "Happy Birthday, Edison" on May 17, 2011 at the Grandview Heights Public Library. The program celebrated the 100th anniversary of the construction of the Grandview Public School building on Fairview Avenue. Today this building comprises the east wing of Edison Intermediate and Middle School. The building contained 8 classrooms and cost \$50,000 in 1911. The program featured photographs and memorabilia, including a copy of the prophetic 1912 dedication speech by Marble Cliff resident, Philip Skeele, a school board member at the time.


The May 17 program was designed as a teaser for the Society's annual meeting, scheduled for Thursday evening, October 13, 2011 in the east wing of Edison school. We will celebrate the centennial of this building, which has served generations of Grandview students. More details will be forthcoming

JEFFREY PHOTOGRAPHERS:

Fred A. Behmer, Sr. (1885-1972) & Fred A. Behmer, Jr. (1908-1968)

The Behmers, father and son, served as Jeffrey Manufacturing photographers for a combined total of nearly 90 years.

Fred, Sr. joined Jeffrey in 1903 at age 17. He left after a year for a two-year stint at Baker Art Gallery of Columbus, then the largest photo studio in the country. In 1906-1907 he was the entire photo staff of the Ohio Sun, a Columbus newspaper. Fred, Sr. was the first local news photographer to cover out-of-town OSU games and owned the first Graflex camera used for press work in Columbus. Returning to Jeffrey in 1908 as Chief Photographer, he remained in that position until 1953, but

continued at Jeffrey for a number of years after stepping down. In 1910 Fred, Sr. made the first big photo blowups in Columbus.

He made photographs for Jeffrey in the 48 states, Canada, and Mexico, including movies of Jeffrey machinery at work, which were begun in 1924. Fred A. Behmer, Jr. (GHHS 1926) began working part-time for

Jeffrey while he was at OSU and in December 1933 joined his dad at Jeffrey, full-time. In May 1953 Fred, Jr. succeeded his father as head of Jeffrey Photography Department. By this time, he also had done Jeffrey industrial photography in the 48 states, Canada and Mexico, having succeeded his father in much of the "road work."

We anticipate that this process will also lead to another valuable partnership. The Society and the Library are looking forward to eventually having GH/MCHS materials included and available online through the Library's PhotOhio Project.

Breezeway Update

The "breezeway" in the Bank Block building on Grandview Avenue will be refreshed and updated in the near future. We plan to keep the Bank Block History window intact, per our agreement with the Wagenbrenner Company. The Urlin's Grand View subdivision window will be refreshed and new material added. New material in the other display windows will include a feature on Grandview Heights resident G. Edwin Smith, president of the G. Edwin Smith Shoe Company and the Columbus YMCA.

Present GH/MCHS publications will be featured. Another new display will be photo documentation of recent area reconstruction and renovation, including Grandview Yard, the Grandview Theatre, the new 4-story retail/residence (The Windsor) which replaces the Kingswood Building on Grandview Avenue north of Third, and new private residences and apartment buildings.

Query: Can anyone help us document when the "breezeway" was cut through from Grandview Avenue to the parking lot?
