
LOCAL LINCOLN CONNECTION HIGHLIGHT OF ANNUAL MEETING by TOM DEMARIA

he Lincoln presidency, his final hours, Civil War Washington, DC Society, and family history took on a whole new meaning for the 50 members and friends in attendance at the Grandview Heights/Marble Cliff Historical Society annual meeting Sunday, September 10. Local resident Caroline Welling Van Duesen shared family memorabilia and memoirs of her great-great-grand-mother Elizabeth Dixon, wife of Connecticut Senator James Dixon and close friend of the Lincolns. Attendees marvelled at the very personal reminiscences of this rich family history collection, complete with a vast array of photographs and autographs from such figures as the Lincolns, Charles Dickens and General McClellan.

The Society is indebted to Caroline for her masterful, personal and intimate presentation and to her great great grandmother Elizabeth whose detailed journal entries thrill us 125 years after her death. 
